Legislation

The library is governed by the **Public Libraries Act**, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.44 https://www.ontario.ca/laws/statute/90p44

The library must also follow all relevant legislation such as the Employment Standards Act, Occupational Health and Safety Act, Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act, etc.



Policies

The Library Board is responsible for the Library's policies which are separate from the Municipality's policies.

- The library's policies are based on a combination of provincial regulations as well as guidelines provided by the Ontario Library Service.
- Human Resources policies align with the Municipal policies.

Budget

\$291,440 total budget

- Library costs include:
 - Services (programs, books, e-books and eAudiobooks, DVDs, magazines, computers, etc.)
 - Building expenses (hydro, propane, insurance, janitorial supplies, etc.)
 - Staff costs (UIC/CPP/OMERS/WCB, wages, training)



Budget

Library revenues include:

- Municipal levy \$239 590 in 2022
- Provincial grants \$29 073 in 2022
- Fundraising including Good Buy Room, book sales, donations, etc.
- Other grants when available (e.g. Canada Post grant in 2022, Connectivity grant from OLS, etc.)



Council and the Library

- There is typically one Council Representative on the Library Board
- I do an annual budget presentation and try to do a library update annually during Ontario Public Library Week.



Library Board

- Governed by the *Public Libraries Act*
- Consists of 7 members of the community including one Council Representative
- Library Board is the employer of Library Staff


Susan Warren






MakerSpaces and Technology

Yarn Exchange

- The Buckhorn library has a Yarn Exchange program where people can take yarn or drop off extra yarn which allows everyone to have access to yarn, which is normally an expensive hobby. It also helps reduce landfill waste when there is leftover yarn from projects.
- We encourage people to make items for our local shelters we have free patterns available for hats, mittens, sweaters, etc. Pet blankets make for perfect beginner projects too!




Children's Programs Attendance

January-October 2018-2022




E-Book Downloads

Circulation (physical materials)



Library Services Value

If local residents had purchased everything they borrowed at the library between **January** and **October** of 2022, it would have cost them \$555,969. The total library budget for 2022 is \$291,440.
